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U.S. steps up fight against Omicron as variant marches across globe

WASHINGTON/BERLIN, Dec 2 (Reuters) - President Joe Biden on Thursday laid out his strategy to fight the coronavirus as the highly contagious Omicron spread across the globe with winter coming and hours after the first known U.S. case of community transmission of the variant was reported.

With authorities around the world scrambling to contain Omicron, Biden warned in no uncertain terms that infections will rise this winter.

"We're going to fight this variant with science and speed, not chaos and confusion,' he said, speaking at the National Institutes of Health medical research facility in Maryland.

So far three U.S. states have found Omicron cases -- California, Colorado and Minnesota. In all three cases, the patients were fully vaccinated and developed mild

a and Colorado, the patients had recently returned from trips to southern Africa and had not gotten booster doses. The case in Minnesota is the first known community transmission within the United States. read more

The patient in Minnesota had recently travelled to New York City for an anime convention, prompting the city to launch contact tracing to try to contain the spread.

"We are aware of a case of the Omicron variant identified in Minnesota that is associated with travel to a conference in New York City, and we should assume there is community spread of the variant in our city," New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio said.

Much remains unknown about Omicron, which was first detected in southern Africa last month and has been reported in at least two dozen countries, just as parts of Europe were already grappling with a wave of infections of the Delta variant.

Under Biden's plan, the United States will require inbound international passengers to be tested for COVID-19 within one day of departure, regardless of vaccination status. Mask requirements on airplanes, trains and public transportation vehicles will be extended to March 18. read more

The U.S. government will require private health insurers to reimburse their 150 million customers for 100% of the cost of over-thecounter, at-home COVID-19 tests, adminis-



tration officials said, and make 50 million more tests available free through rural clinics and health centers for the uninsured.

Less than 60% of the U.S. population, or 196 million people, have been fully vaccinated, one of the lowest rates among wealthy nations.

THE ECONOMY

Fears about the Omicron variant have pounded financial markets and created doubts about the speed of the global economic recovery as the pandemic rages on. Shares fell on Thursday, and crude oil futures extended losses. read more

The variant could slow global economic growth by exacerbating supply chain problems and depressing demand, U.S Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen told the Reuters Next conference on Thursday.

"There's a lot of uncertainty, but it could cause significant problems. We're still evaluating that," she said.

Eager to avoid derailing a fragile recovery of Europe's biggest economy, Germany had kept businesses open to the almost 69% of the population that is fully vaccinated as well as those with proof of having recovered from the virus.

But on Thursday, the country announced it would bar the unvaccinated from all but essential businesses such as grocery stores and pharmacies, while legislation to make vaccination mandatory will be drafted for early next year. read more

"We have understood that the situation is very serious," Chancellor Angela Merkel told a news conference.

A nationwide vaccination mandate could take effect from February 2022 after it is debated in the Bundestag and after guidance from Germany's Ethics Council, she said.

HIGH TRANSMISSION

The European Union's public health agency said the variant could be responsible for more than half of all COVID infections in Europe within a few months. read more

A group of South African health bodies said on Thursday their latest findings indicated the variant posed a threefold higher risk of reinfection than the currently dominant Delta variant and the Beta strain. read more

The country also said it was seeing an increase in COVID-19 reinfections in patients contracting Omicron - with people who have already had the illness getting infected again - in a way that it did not see with other variants.

Global travel curbs accelerated on Thursday in response to the threat from Omicron.

In the Netherlands, health authorities called for pre-flight COVID-19 tests for all travel from outside the European Union, after it turned out that most of the passengers who tested positive after arriving on two flights from South Africa on Nov. 26 had been vaccinated. read more

"The World Health Organization classified Omicron as a "variant of concern," due to the number of mutations that might help it spread or evade antibodies from prior infection or vaccination.

Key Points COVID-19 Variants Threaten To Undermine Global Vaccine **Programs Unless We Accelerate** The Pace Of Delivery.

- Just over 1% of people in low-income countries have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine.
- In order to control the spread of COVID-19, we need a global effort to ensure no one is left behind in immunization campaigns.

A new wave of COVID-19 is engulfing many countries around the world primarily due to the increasingly prevalent and more transmissible Delta variant of the new coronavirus. With only a few regional exceptions, Delta is mounting a successful global attack. In Indonesia and other Asian countries, health systems are overwhelmed and running out of oxygen. Across Africa – from Tunisia in the north to South Africa – the virus is surging; recently, recorded deaths on the continent jumped 40% in one week alone. In Europe, plans to lift or relax lockdowns are being delayed or modified. And in countries like the US and the UK, a number of key COVID-19 metrics have started to increase after months of decline. The Delta variant (first discovered in India) and

other variants of concern including Beta (South Africa) and Gamma (Brazil), are confirming the critical need to vaccinate billions of people around the world – fast. In the race between variants and vaccines, we are falling behind. Failure to pick up the pace now will enable this virus to multiply and mutate to the point where future variants could outsmart our vaccines



In the quest to vaccinate every citizen of the world against COVID-19, speed and strategy are key.

It's essential to think smartly about the impressive armamentarium of vaccines at our disposal and ensure we don't squander any of these lifesaving assets. No single vaccine can conquer COVID-19 - we need many. Each vaccine should be deployed to the frontlines, targeted to where they can make the greatest impact so that no population is left behind. Above all, we need to follow through on vaccine delivery all the way from the supply depot to the last mile, turning every available vaccine dose into a vaccination in someone's arm

At Johnson & Johnson, it was precisely this kind of pandemic scenario that informed our selection of a single-dose vaccine that could be easily transported without the need for ultra-cold refrigeration. Of course, no vaccine developer could have predicted how the original Wuhan strain of coronavirus would evolve, and whether their vaccines would hold up against emerging variants.

Recent research published in the New England Journal of Medicine, along with a large real-world study of health workers in South Africa, suggests that the vaccine generates strong immune responses against Delta and other variants of concern. We now await results on protective efficacy from our large-scale clinical



While getting vaccine science right is never easy, vaccine deployment on

a global scale - in the middle of a pandemic presents other challenges. Underscoring this, only slightly more than 1% of people in low-income countries have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine. This has to change, not just for reasons of global equity, but because if we don't get COVID-19 under control everywhere, we will not be able to end this pandemic

How do we crack the challenge of global deployment?

Intensify international cooperation and **cross-sector partnerships** between industry, governments, health systems and civil society. Turning COVID-19 vaccines into vaccinations involves executing countless legal agreements, establishing no-fault compensation coverage for vaccine recipients, streamlining regulatory

processes, overseeing technology transfers with production partners, setting up pharmacovigilance systems, and coordinating closely with many global partners. This complex, multistep process, which normally takes years to complete, must be compressed into weeks.

• The global community needs to get behind **COVAX**, the unprecedented initiative working to ensure that the world's pandemic response includes concrete plans to enable access for lower-income countries, and vulnerable populations including those in conflict and crisis environments. Governments with surplus vaccines should immediately ramp up their dose sharing via COVAX. Stockpiling vaccine supplies will only prolong the pandemic. An example to emulate is the United States government, which recently embarked on the largest vaccine donation programme undertaken by any country in history.



· It involves the deployment of three COVID-19 vaccines from different manufacturers, and we're proud to be part of it.

So far, nearly 30 million doses of our vaccine have been donated to more than 30 countries across four continents – many through CO-VAX. This is just a start: millions more doses to many more countries will follow.

• Maintain the free flow of the global vaccine supply chain. Countries around the world are racing to vacci-

nate their populations against COVID-19. In order to reach herd immunity, it's estimated that at least 60% of a population (and as much as 90%) must become immune thanks either to prior infection or vaccination. But as of 10 February nearly 130 countries, with a collective population of 2.5 billion, had yet to administer a

While some 10 different COVID-19 vaccines have been approved or authorized for emergency or limited use, the practical business of administering jabs has been hindered by staffing and supply shortages, procurement hiccups, and geopolitics. Concerns have also been raised about equitable access for poorer countries and historically-marginalized communities.

But there have also been positive signs, including Israel's relatively swift rollout, an upwardly revised daily vaccination target in the US, and India's distribution of free doses to countries including Myanmar and Bangladesh.

The Convidecia vaccine developed in China may just require just one dose, for example, but the Pfizer-BioNTech version already approved for use in several countries and the Sputnik V vaccine developed in Russia are among those

U.S. COVID Cases Start To Rise Again As The Holidays Approach



It's a worrying sign for the U.S. ahead of the numbers, and that comes after many weeks holiday travel season: coronavirus infections are of high case counts and stress on states in the rising in more than half of all states. And unlike last year, the U.S. has to contend with a much more contagious version of the virus "that makes it really hard to snuff out chains of transmission." not to mention "human nature. which is wanting us to get back to pre-pandemic life" says Reich at UMass Amherst

Just how bad the situation gets will come down to complex dynamics around immunity Southern states endured a brutal wave over the summer and that may have built up enough immunity from infection to shield them from another big resurgence this winter. Areas that did not face the same kind of surge, in particular states in the northern half of the country, are now dealing with an increase, but many also have the benefit of higher vaccination coverage



"The real question is, how big will it get and will it really be substantial? And my sense is in New England, it's going to hit a wall of vaccinated people," says Dr. Ashish Jha, dean of Brown University's School of Public Health

"I think the Midwest and the Great Plains which have lower vaccination rates but have not seen a big delta surge — they may very well end up seeing quite a few infections in the weeks and months ahead.

Even with a small surge, hospitals could still suffer

Even if hospitals see fewer COVID-19 patients overall, it's already clear that many are less prepared to handle the demands of the pandemic compared to last year.

"Every hospital I have talked to in the last month has severe shortages of staff, especially nurses,' says Dr. Bruce Siegel, president of America's Essential Hospitals, which represents hundreds of public hospitals in the U.S

At the University of Utah Hospital, Dr. Graves

says their surge ICU was closed down because they couldn't staff it anymore, and last month patients were waiting on average between three to five hours for an ICU bed. "Our resources and our stamina are far less now than a year ago." she says In the Southwest, hospitals are also dealing with

packed ICUs. New Mexico has higher vaccination rates than many nearby states, but the state was forced to enact its crisis standards of care plan weeks ago. Some hospitals have activated those plans, but none have moved to the most extreme scenario of deciding who gets care and who doesn't, says Troy Clark, president of the New Mexico Hospital Association.

Starting in the spring, there was a "huge influx of patients that we don't normally see" with other urgent medical needs, Clark says. That has kept hospitals extremely busy heading into winter — and with no slack to accommodate the growing number of COVID-19 patients.

It's a similar situation in many states, including Arizona where hospitalizations for COVID-19 are now as high as they've been since February. "We just don't have that extra capacity for a COVID spike," says Ann-Marie Alameddin, president of the Arizona Hospital and Healthcare Association.



The upper Midwest now has some of the highest cases per capita in the country. Hospitals leaders in Minnesota are

to take caution so they don't require medical care for COVID or non-COVID emergencies. "This has never been more serious," said Kelly Chandler of Itasca County Public Health. which includes the city of Grand Rapids, in a recent public statement. "We are at crisis levels of 2020, but without the same levels of COVID precautions in place.'

As we head into the holidays, COVID risk increases, with more people traveling and socializing indoors. But "we also have some things that are helping, like more vaccines and kids getting vaccinated," says Brown's Jha. "So we're in a stalemate. I don't expect us to have a horrible surge, but I can certainly imagine parts of the country that see modest-sized surges as people get together and as the weather stays cold." Covid-19 Cases Increasing In 50% Of The U.S. Coronavirus cases are increasing again in more than half of the U.S., possibly indicating the beginning of a new surge for the winter. The recent uptick marks a turnaround after cases had continually declined from about mid-September through late October. The U.S. is now reporting an average of more than 83,000 cases per day, which is a 14% increase from last week and

12% from the week before. "I hate to say it, but I suspect we're at the start of a new winter surge," George Rutherford, MD, an epidemiologist at the University of California at San Francisco, told NPR.

"There are still large swaths of the country

under-immunized." Rutherford said. "Even among states that are relatively well-vaccinated, like Colorado, New Mexico, Minnesota and Vermont, we're seeing sustained transmission.' The top current outbreaks are growing in the Midwest and Northeast, Michigan and Minnesota lead the country in highest cases per capita. where infections increased more than 60% in a 2-week period, according to The New York

The growth in cases hasn't yet led to a nationwide increase in hospitalizations and deaths, which tends to trail infections by a few weeks. NPR reported. But some parts of the West, Mountain West and upper Midwest are facing crisis hospitalization levels.

随着史密斯将病毒大流行放置到更大 的参照系中探讨时,今年秋天,一批完全面 对新冠病毒的书出现了。萨拉·霍尔(Sarah Hall) 在春季封锁的第一天就开始创作 的《烧衣(Burntcoat)》讲述了一对恋人在 瘟疫肆虐的世界中面对新形式的亲密关系。 萨拉·莫斯(Sarah Moss)的《坠落》 (The Fell) 写于冬季隔离的无望时期,讲 述了一个因禁闭而发狂的自我孤立的女人。

《没有孩子的生活(Life Without Children)》是罗迪·多伊尔(Roddy Doyle)在都 柏林封锁期间写的小说集。在这本书里,多 伊尔用怪异的想象探索着正在形成的新世界 和它的语言习惯——"在都柏林的商店里, 人们正在购买'一个半(one and a half) 社交距离'的胶合板"。

正如史密斯的角色Iris观察到的,在过 去两年里,将当下生活进行战时比较越来越 频繁。对许多人来说,病毒仿佛发起了一场 新的"闪电战"。在医院里,一直存在着类 似战时的灾难气氛。但大多数人来说,隔离 是一个等待的时期。作家们面临的挑战是, 如何从待在家里的人身上创造出叙事?

这是一个充满启示的时候。当年的鲍 恩将她的战时故事描述为"清晰的异常"。 她认为,在新的严酷之中,我们要揭示出彼 此的精神状况与真实处境。

萨拉·霍尔(Sarah Hall)认为,病毒 起到了"揭露的作用 (clarifying force)" 。在一定程度上,它让我们看见了社会的裂 缝(政府腐败、国家服务、不平等)。但在 《烧衣(Burntcoat)》中,隔离的方式让这 对恋人成为脆弱的身体,暴露在对方面前, 当这对恋人越来越接近死亡时,性爱变得更 加亲密。

在《烧衣》中,霍尔让病毒变得更加 致命,隔离也比现实的更加极端。在《卫报 》的采访中,霍尔谈及她与一位病毒学家的 谈话,她说,那些潜伏在我们周围的其他病 毒"正随时准备出发","新冠病毒不会是 那个真正把我们打倒的病毒"。小说家正在 对可能的未来发出警告。 02隔离本身成为主题

对隔离的恐惧,成为悬疑作家的创作话 题。作为资深的惊悚小说作家,凯瑟琳-莱 恩·霍华德 (Catherine Ryan Howard) 认为 ,犯罪在这个秘密、恐惧和猜疑已经泛滥的 时代兴起。她的小说《56天(56 Days)》 开始于一对恋人在禁闭的压力下搬到一起, 并问道,完美的谋杀是否正是禁闭所允许的 ?在格雷厄姆·格林的战时小说《恐惧内阁 (The Ministry of Fear)》中,他借由一位 人物发问,在如此众多的死亡中,为什么任 何一件谋杀都是重要的?谋杀很可能基于普 通的动机,但霍华德的小说试图集中探讨个

人的死亡和脆弱之于我们生活的意义。 在萨拉·莫斯 (Sarah Moss) 和罗迪·多 伊尔(Roddy Doyle)的书中,作家把隔离 而非病毒视作探讨的对象。有人说,在隔离 期间,每个人都变得更加自我,在没有社交 的情况下,人们的焦虑或者痴狂会变得更加 极端。莫斯并不同意这一观点,她认为,我 们在公司而不是在隔离中变得最自我。在多 伊尔故事中,主人公大多是中年男人,有的 男人利用隔离走出了自己原本的生活,或者 爱上了他们多年来没有注意的妻子。

莫斯的叙述可以被看作是最困难的, 因为如果像史密斯所强调的那样,疫情已经 ren Groff)曾说,她 表明我们的世界是如此支离破碎,那么书写 隔离的危险可能是连贯性太强。

如今,我们在萨莉·鲁尼(Sally Rooney)和雷切尔·卡斯克(Rachel Cusk) 的书中看到了走向隔离的意愿,以及对叙事 的疲惫。

鲁尼最新的小说《美丽世界,你在哪 里》主要发生在隔离之前,但描述了一个作 家爱丽丝退缩到一个偏远的海滨别墅,在保 护自己不被他人发现和被强迫同这个世界发 生连接之间的张力与纠结。卡斯克的"纲要 三部曲(Outline trilogy)",描绘了一个 在她的世界里日益孤立的女人,为小说寻找 一种不依赖整体叙事结构的形式实验。在她 最新的小说《第二场所(Second Place)》 的背景中,叙述者观察到她的生活比许多其 他人的生活变化要小("我们已经简化了我 们的存在")。

莫斯拒绝接受隔离的乐趣,也许是因 为她自己从一开始就害怕隔离所带来的束缚 。她在哥本哈根说:"相比于病毒本身,有 些人更害怕隔离"。她的小说是对我们在隔 离中所失去的一切的挽歌,尽管她也对我们 的生存能力充满希望。她说,这本书是从一 个问题开始的: 当我们跌倒时, 谁来接住我 们?危险在于,封锁会侵蚀社区共同体,在 网络的驱动下,二元思维成为常态,我们可 能不再认识到彼此的人性。 03超越病毒的写作可能?

有意思的是,当病毒大流行开始时, 莫斯和道伊尔都放弃了他们写到一半的小说 ,因为他们无法思考如何进入另一种形式的 当下。读了这些封锁小说和故事后,我们必 须发问,在没有太多重复的情况下,还能出 版多少本书?不把病毒写进小说又意味着什 么?或者,作家们会通过转向历史或未来, 来避免病毒带来的文学挑战吗?

景,是避免写得太狭隘的一种方法,就像霍 尔所做的那样。病毒向来是科幻小说和气候 变化小说的领域。多年来,科幻作家一直在 思考流感大流行可能带来的后果。新冠病毒 揭示了我们的生活与其他物种之间有多大的 联系。劳拉-简·麦凯(Laura Jean McKay) 在她的"阿瑟·克拉克奖"获奖小说《那个 国家的动物(The Animals in That Country)》中对人类和动物之间的关系进行了勇 敢的探讨。该书想象一个受"动物流感 Zooflu"袭击的世界,它使人类和动物能够 理解对方的语言。

欧娜·阿里斯蒂德 (Oana Aristide) 的 《蓝色之下(Under the Blue)》将虚构的 流行病与人工智能的发展结合起来一 开发一种新的人工智能,以预测对人类生命 的威胁并帮助我们处理这类危机。这两本书 在病毒暴发时都已经准备付梓,因为封锁而 推迟了。这样的书被证明是有预言性的,因 为文学小说——它的艺术性、创造性和结构

柳原汉雅 (Hanya Yanagihara) 即将出 版的小说《到天堂去(To Paradise)》写到 了2093年,想象了一个被瘟疫撕裂的极权 世界,可以看作是我们时代的黑暗延伸。长 崎红杉 (Sequoia Nagamatsu) 的《我们在 黑暗中走多高(How High We Go in the Dark)》跨越了数百年,人类试图在瘟疫后 重建自己。加里·施泰因加特(Gary Shteyngart)的《我们乡村之友(Our Country Friends)》以2020年的封锁为背景,描 绘了一群朋友在乡村隐居之处以薄伽丘的方 式等待大流行的情况。这三部小说都在一月 份问世,显示出不同类型的文学装置是如何 被我们当前时代所影响的。今后还会有更多 的疫情小说作家们试图追问这个被封锁的社 会发生了什么,探索新冠病毒所揭示的社会 和我们讲述的故事是否能保持一致,通过病 毒的探照灯显现出"清晰的异常"。



疫情影響各行各業,反觀台灣影視產業卻有許多優質台劇傾巢而出,讓許多本來不關注台劇的觀眾回籠,近期最受矚目的就是號稱 最美台劇的《茶金》對上最華麗台劇《華燈初上》,兩部劇更是將這波熱潮推向高峰!《華燈初上》製作人戴天易與《茶金》製作人湯 昇榮兩人接受《TVBS新聞網》專訪,進行一場強強對談,道出近期台劇局勢,也分享外界最好奇的幕後祕辛。

2021年堪稱台劇爆發期,繼《天橋上的魔術師》、《火神的眼淚》、《俗女養成記 2》等,陸續有許多好戲再度點燃觀眾對台劇的熱情。對比許多走小品路線的台劇,《茶金》和《華燈初上》無論在卡司、造型、場景及細節考究上都花了相當大的功夫,當然還砸了大筆金錢,精緻程度突破台劇新高。巧的是,這兩部劇的製作人湯昇榮和戴天易是13年前客家電視台《花樹下的約定》就認識,當時湯昇榮是客台副台長,戴天易是《花》劇的行銷,在這條路上,兩人亦師亦友,到現在變成最大的競爭對手!

《茶金》製作人湯昇榮和《華燈初上 》製作人戴天易對於台劇力大爆發,兩人 都認爲跟國際平台大舉進攻有很大的關係

湯昇榮說:「我覺得這幾年也是國際 平台進來,大家也看到其他國家很厲害的 戲劇,台灣過去都在累積、每年都有很好 的戲,但這2年大家逐漸找到說故事的方 法,劇本團隊、導演的方法也在改變,還 有市場行銷跟社群媒體,我們迎來了一個 很好的時機點,所以一棒接一棒,很多的 戲的樣態都在出現,加上政府機關、學界 與投資方都加入這個戰場,整個大環境都 很好,還有電影人、音樂家與很多厲害的 歌手參與,所以今年是一個很漂亮的年。

戴天易則認爲:「這幾年其實都有很棒的作品,包括《我們與惡的距離》、《俗女養成記》、《誰是被害者》、《我的婆婆怎麼那麼可愛》、《若是一個人》等等,有看到台劇一直在改變,近年的影響就是國際平台的加入,改變的觀眾的收看習慣,題材也不再受傳統思維框架,爲什麼《茶金》、《華燈初上》能這麼成功,第一因爲我們上了國際平台,第二是藉由台灣媒體的力量去協助它,這絕對是疊加效果。」

雖然台劇做出好成績,不過在創作過程中,兩人都遇到無數挑戰,尤其2部作品都是高成本、大製作的時代劇,從前置作業就相當耗費心力,這中間遇到最困難的挑戰在哪裡?

湯昇榮說:「我們比較難的是需要很多的田調跟知識性的東西,以《茶金》來講,它所要面臨的面向很大,動員的人很多,找茶業、古董車;拍攝廠景的規模都很大,我們動用了好多茶葉園跟茶廠,把它拼成一個樣子,在建構場景方面超困難,而第一集在印度、最後在倫敦,這些都

是要用動畫去做,本來沒疫情就要去當地 拍,我們的戲都有難度、都不簡單,每齣 都是挑戰。」

戴天易說:「《華燈》最難的就是製作費的控管,我跟導演還另外一位製作人對峙好幾次,「光」本來想實景架設,但是這樣製作費會很高,如果場景太散編劇也不好安排,所以在製作費的討論下我們去調整劇本,讓「光」在中影文化城搭建場景,集中在那邊做拍攝,才能有效控制成本,所以這次在製作費的掌控是最難的、很辛苦,之前超支2次,要跟各位製作人說,不管拿多少錢,製作費的控管是最重要的。」

兩部戲除了各個細節讓外界驚艷, 聚集了華麗的演員卡司更是一大亮點, 幾乎所有實力派、有討論度的演員都加 入演出陣容,讓觀眾驚呼「沒有一個不 是咖」,兩位是否可以分享當初選角遇 到的狀況?

戴天易說:「我覺得找演員反而是個順利的過程,像找蘇媽媽這個角色,心如一看就說是楊謹華,即便我們都覺得爲何心如自己不演,但她說就是謹華。她不會以製作人的角度去挑角色演,她會以誰比較適合這部戲,其實這6個小姐找的過程

都很順利,只有2個我跟連奕琦有衝突, 是劉品言跟郭雪芙,郭雪芙因為導演覺得 她是偶像劇出身,不知道她能不能演出這 角色,劉品言是我覺得這角色應該會有更 好的人選,結果華華這個角色大中,好吧 ,算我看走眼(笑)。」

湯昇榮則透露:「我的演員更難找, 因爲全劇主要用客語對話,還夾雜台語和 英文,所以第一關就是要測試演員口條, 其實我們一開始海選很多人進來,因爲海 陸客家話不好講,所以就先挑出一些可以 辦到的人,當然有些人是我們從形象上去 找到,比如說薛仕凌、連俞涵,尤其是郭 子乾這個角色,中間換過非常多演員來試 ,原本是想要找夏靖庭來演,不過因爲他 的時間搭不上,我們就放棄,直接讓他演 爸爸。」

《華燈初上》、《茶金》同時登上國際平台Netflix,並獲得巨大成功,引發迴響,湯昇榮和戴天易都認爲這是對台劇的投石問路,未來在作品呈現上會更加著重IP設定,期盼能帶給觀眾更多面向的戲劇作品。對於影視市場正式進入串流時代,兩人都認爲是一個非常好的現象,在創作的道路上不必被收視率綁架。

《茶金》溫昇豪登演藝巔峰! 製作人曝他「私下面貌」

製作人湯昇榮是夯劇《我們與惡的距離》、《火神的眼淚》等作品的重要推手,近期又推出時代劇《茶金》,鮮明的時代背景、精緻的美術設計,再度驚艷觀眾,被譽爲「最美台劇」,而這幾部劇中都有溫昇豪,完全是愛將般的存在。湯昇榮接受《TVBS新聞網》專訪,親揭溫昇豪的「私下面貌」。

《茶金》開場映入眼簾的就是一片壯闊茶園,瞬間將觀眾帶入1950年代,從場景、服裝處處可見用心,湯昇榮憶起當初拍攝過程說:「我覺得場景真的是最麻煩,因爲人擺在裡面,然後周邊環境要處理成那個年代,就充滿各種困難,隨時都有可能穿幫。」

爲了呈現那個年代的真實生活樣貌,每個細節都十分講究,一個費心打造的美軍俱樂部場景,僅在劇中出現短短2分鐘,湯昇榮有感而發說:「不只是這個戲,我們產業也需要練兵,任何的美、韓、日劇,他們在做時代劇,整體的美學、美術的研究、質感,確實我們沒做到一定水準,未來跟其他國家比都會差一截。」



除了畫面呈現的用心,湯昇榮挑選演員 也別具慧眼,談起多次合作的溫昇豪,笑說 :「他還是模特兒剛轉到戲劇圈就認識,他 就一直很大男孩、很誠懇,也有點文青感, 私下卻有點台客,所以他有很多面向,我覺 得他是滿有趣,本質非常爽朗的人。」

湯昇榮坦言與溫昇豪特別投緣,因此 有好的角色都會第一個就會想到他,接連
